

Lets go back to that first hand we bid to 6Sp but this time use cue bidding.

Opener cuebids 4C* to show the Ace clubs.
Responder cuebids 4H* to show the Ace Hrts.

Opener now knows enough to bid 6Sp.

Actually if you wish you can use cuebids AND Blackwood on the same hand.

Try this one :

Cue bids allow us to make an initial move towards slam at the 4 level { and have the safeguard that should partner have no Aces or the "wrong" Ace that we can still stop in 4.} They also allow us to use Blackwood to check (*doublecheck* perhaps , on the total number of Aces held).

Want to know what a "wrong" Ace is ?
Look see.

4Sp-----Pass. {NB opener signs off in 4Sp}.

Opener knew that partner didn't hold the Ace diamond (because they cue bid 4H* and not 4D*) and so knows to shut up shop and sign off in 4Sp. The Ace Hrts was in a sense , the "wrong" Ace for partner to hold.
Despite having 30 pts and 3 Aces , six spades has no chance.
